Did the NDP Douse the Dumpster Fire?

On January 29, 2018, Attorney General David Eby called ICBC a "dumpster fire". He promised change. His office proceeded with a number of efforts to control expert disbursement costs and follow the lead of other provinces with a 'cap' on minor injury claims. Those interim steps gave way to the 'no fault' regime, which has now been in place since May 2021. In this session, Aron and Annie will review the history of changes made since 2018 and the issues that will arise in the short term, depending on timing of claims. They will address the types of motor vehicle accident claims they have worked on and how those claims are typically defended. From there, they will discuss the results of BC Regulation 4/2021 and share their opinion as to the impact of 'no fault' on municipalities.

Sensor Solutions to Reduce Municipality Property Risks

In Canada, an estimated \$1.3 billion is paid in non-weather water claims each year (Munich Re estimate), and that number continues to grow. The best sensor solutions consist of commercial grade sensors, designed for indoor commercial and residential applications, and should measure water, pipe, ambient temperature, and humidity. Three pitches will be selected for members to present during the Raptors' Room session at the 2022 MIABC Risk Management Conference. If selected, each group will have ten minutes to pitch their risk management project idea during the conference, emphasizing how the idea will be effective in reducing risk in your community.

The Judges will then ask questions and provide feedback based on the following weighted criteria:

Efficacy: How effective will the project be in impacting the identified risk?

Transferability: How well will other members benefit from the implementation of this idea?

Innovation: Is the idea innovative and new?

Creativity: Did the group present the pitch in a manner that was interesting and engaging?

Conference delegates will vote on which pitch gets funded during the Raptors Room session on Thursday, April 14th. Local governments not selected to present at the conference will receive a free policy review under the MIABC's Loss Control Program.




